About Texas River School

Texas River School has spent 20 years building relationships with nature for the children of Austin. Texas River School provides fun, safe, engaging, and educational outdoor experiences for grade-school students who may not otherwise have the opportunity.

Texas River School uses the river as a classroom to teach and reinforce important personal growth initiatives such as leadership, self-discipline and civic responsibility; and create a connection to and affection for Texas waterways.

Since 1997, Texas River School has conducted nearly 200 canoe trips and have taken nearly 5,000 area youth on the river, including canoeing, swimming, snorkeling, camping, and much more. Texas River School strives to connect children with nature and abide by our motto: "Keeping our kids and rivers healthy!"

Mission

Texas River School is organized to promote and provide awareness and education about surface and ground water resources, and their preservation, conservation, and protection. We achieve these goals by:

- Establishing, developing programming for and operation classes, camps and similar educational programs for youth which focus on rivers, aquifers, conservation, and water activities.
- Establishing, developing programming for and operating programs for education, recreation, outreach and related activities for the general public related to water resources.
- Establishing, financing and operating facilities, both free and for fee, for members, youth and the general public in support of this programming.



History

The Texas River School is a grassroots, non-profit 201 (c) (3) organization founded in 1992 by Joe Kendall with the intention of combining outdoor education, swimming, and canoeing skills with healthy nutritional reinforcement. The Chautauqua Foundation serves as the parent organization to Texas River School.

- **1997** – Texas River School began conducting canoe trips
- **1998** – The first "Discover the Source" Program is implemented
- **1999** – Executive Director, Joe Kendall, acquired land in the Imperial Valley Development on the Colorado River and created the River Camp
- **2004** – Texas River School partners with Texas Rowing Center
- **2008** – First major fundraiser, Paddlefest, is held
- **2009** – The "Down River" program is created
- **2011** – A grant is awarded from LCRA, enabling River Camp improvements.
- **2012** – River Camp becomes an official TPWD river-access point

Joe has been more than instrumental in Texas River School programs – he is the reason for them. Joe began to impact Texas Rivers in 1991 when he founded The Chautauqua Foundation. He created this foundation to protect Texas Rivers and streams and soon after founded Texas River School.

With a passion for experiential learning versus being “taught,” he is the catalyst for the River School’s success – from putting in long hours and days on rivers and in the classroom to providing expertise and gear for a trip, he is involved with every aspect of the organization.

“The river school’s camp is situated off of FM 969 in a subdivision initially developed in the 1970s but later abandoned because it was located in the river’s flood plain. The area became an illegal dump site until the Chautauqua Foundation installed a gate and enlisted Travis County officials to help clean it up. Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Lower Colorado River Authority have provided grant money to develop the property and equip the river school with gear. The river school provides the camping program to the Sanchez students for free. Instructors with the Texas River School visited Sanchez four times before the trip, preparing students for the overnight experience. Most of the students participated in a day trip last year, too, paddling down Lady Bird Lake while learning why it’s important to protect natural resources.”

“Joe Kendall started the Texas River School in 1992, aiming to share his passion for paddling and the river with the next generation. Since then, more than 4,000 elementary school children have gone through this introductory paddling program, which begins with an hour-long lesson in paddling safety skills on dry land. After today’s trip, a representative will visit the students in their classroom to discuss the experience. ‘We hope to instill a connection with nature, because they’re not getting it,’ says Kendall, now the group’s executive director. ‘There’s a nature deficit.’”

PROGRAMS & ACTIVITIES

Programs

Discover the Source

The Discover the Source program is a canoeing program for area youth, ages 9 to 18, which emphasizes the importance of the “source” of Barton Springs. This one-day trip includes discussions of the Edward’s Aquifer, Barton Springs pool, Barton Creek, Lady Bird Lake, and more.

Colorado Downriver Trip

The Colorado Downriver Trip starts at the Montopolis Street Bridge and ends at the Texas River School’s Canoe Camp. This trip emphasizes the importance of a river in a more rural setting.

Overnight Canoe Camping Trip

The Overnight Canoe Camping Trip is a program for the more experienced students. This trip takes place on the Colorado River, from the Montopolis Street Bridge to the Texas River School’s Canoe Camp. Highlights include four miles of paddling, setting up camp, outdoor meals, campfire sing-a-longs, and more.



Activities

Campground & River Access

Texas River School’s River Camp is a wonderful campground and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department’s river access area. It offers eight campsites and opportunities for day use, fishing, boating, and picnicking. The River Camp is secluded yet has a view of the Austin Downtown skyline.

Moonlight Bat Float

Guided by the moonlight, this unique and fun water event features live music with Austin musicians. Proceeds from this event help support many programs and activities of Texas River School. The evening begins with check-in on the docks of Texas Rowing Center. After receiving a brief, basic paddling lesson and a few safety tips, you are ready to go kayaking or canoeing. You then push off and paddle down to the Congress Street Bridge where we watch the bats emerge for their night flight.
